

Conflict Minerals Policy

There is growing global concern over mining operations in the eastern region of the Democratic Republic of the Congo and neighboring countries (collectively, the "DRC") that are using mining profits to finance "armed militias", which are engaging in wide spread human rights violations. In an effort to curb violence in the DRC, the U.S. adopted legislation under Section 1502 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform Act pertaining to certain minerals or derivatives, including tin, tantalum, tungsten and gold. These materials are used in many industries, including the electronics industry and the semiconductors industry. The Act requires public reporting companies whose products contain these minerals – referred to as "conflict minerals" – to conduct certain supply chain diligence and make certain specialized disclosure around use of conflict minerals.

FormFactor is committed to the responsible sourcing of conflict minerals used in our products. As is true for many other companies in the electronics industry, we purchase certain products or components that contain these conflict minerals. We are working diligently with our suppliers to establish the origin of the conflict minerals in order to address this important issue and insure that our suppliers and vendors provide FormFactor with products containing only conflict-free minerals.
